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Walnut Street "Pony" Bridge One Step Away from Historical Recognition

On February 8, Hellertown Historical Society received confirmation that the Walnut Street "Pony" Bridge was unanimously approved for nomination to the National Registry of Historic Places (NRHP). The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission Historic Preservation Board of Directors reviewed materials and data provided with our application and recognized the historic significance of the structure and feel it deserves this prestigious recognition.

The next step to finalize the placement on the NRHP is for the National Park Service to review this nomination and render their decision. Although there is no set schedule for this to occur, it is believed it may happen around June or July this year.

While we await this final step to occur, we feel confident in a positive outcome. The fact that the PHMC has rendered their decision unanimously says much about the historic significance and value the bridge offers. That alone is a prestigious boner!

Should the National Park Service meet and approve our nomination for inclusion on the NRHP, there will be much planning for the Society to begin in order to celebrate the honor.

None of this would have occurred if not for the ambition and steadfast enthusiasm of HHS volunteer, Chip Wagner. Chip spearheaded this project by gathering all the information required to submit the application. He also maintained contact with the various agencies to ensure a smooth path toward the final goal. HHS generously thanks Chip for his hard work and tireless sacrifices to ensure this project reaches a positive conclusion. We should note that Chip Wagner is a direct descendant of the Christopher Wagner family who owned and operated the grist mill in the later 1700's. We are very proud of this great honor Chip has provided the Historical Society.

Replica 'Pony' Bridge in Halloween Parade

If you watched the Hellertown Halloween Parade this past October, you saw the Walnut Street "Pony" Bridge travel along the route. Well, a replica of it anyway.

In anticipation of obtaining the prestigious recognition of inclusion of the historic Walnut Street "Pony" Bridge in the National Registry of Historic Places (NRHP), HHS volunteers at the Society built the replica bridge on a trailer bed. It was entered as a float in the Borough parade which featured the theme "Cherishing Our Past...Embracing Our Future". Our replica bridge entry featured the motto, "Bridging the Past to the Present" to coincide with the parade's theme.



Several HHS volunteers walked and rode along with the float handing out candy to eagerly awaiting children. The community response to our float was overwhelmingly positive.

The Hellertown Post Office Turns 200!

On Friday, April 28th, 2023, the Hellertown Post Office celebrated 200 years of service in Hellertown. Among the festivities were several local, state and federal dignitaries providing congratulations and presenting Postmaster, Joe DiRusso with citations to mark the milestone achievement.





Among the many presentations, was a bronze plaque prepared by local businessman Robert Moll recognizing the commitment and distinguished service of all the Hellertown PO personnel over these 200 years.

Hellertown Historical Society was at the event offering handouts and info to visitors describing the Society's mission and activities. The replica Walnut Street-Pony Bridge was also there to promote support for the possible inclusion on the Nation Registry of Historic Places which we hope with be confirmed very soon. One of the handouts is a fact sheet about the actual bridge which once spanned the Saucon Creek on Walnut Street but now is in service as a pedestrian bridge across the grist mill raceway.

Another handout HHS offered was a historical timeline of every Hellertown Post Office location from April 1823 through present time. The booklet featured photos of those past structures, where possible, and how they appear today. The booklet also lists every Postmaster who served in Hellertown from April 1823 – present. As an example of the Society's purpose, the information for this booklet was obtained through research of our historic database. Ceresota Flour Boy Painting

One of Hellertown Historical Society's more interesting historical artifacts is the early advertising painting of the Ceresota Flour Boy.



The boy with his knife cutting bread was painted on a shed just North of the railroad tracks which now serve as the SV Rail-Trail. The sign was strategically placed for advertising to passing trains.

There was a railroad siding and weigh station located there to weigh coal which was another product sold at the Heller-Wagner Grist Mill.



The Ceresota Flour Boy originated at the Consolidated Milling Company based in Minneapolis, MN

in the late 1880's. The boy is named after the Roman Goddess of Agriculture, Ceres.

Grains being ground into flour ceased around 1900 at the Heller-Wagner Mill; from that time forward the Mill produced animal feed. With electricity and rolling mill technology, mills could grind as much as a million pounds of grain each day.

T.M.Ruch's Store

After the death of his mother when he was just 16 days old, Titus Ruch was raised by his uncle, Edward Knauss, a farmer. He taught Titus how to farm and also sent him to school.

However, Titus wanted to be in business and began his career working as a clerk in the E. & D. Moll general store in Hellertown. After two years, he went to work for Hess Brothers who dealt in coal and lumber. He worked for an undertaker for one year as well as working at the Bethlehem Steel Company.

In 1901, he took over the millinery and furnishing store formerly operated by his mother-in-law, Mrs. Reihman. Mrs. Reihman acquired the store through her father, Peter Moll, who built the store in 1832. Titus renamed the store, T. M. and M. W. Ruch Store, using his and wife Mary's initials.

The location of the Ruch Store was 610 Main Street in Hellertown.

Ruch's Store was one of several locations for the Hellertown Post Office, being located there sometime between 1905-1910 through 1914 when it re-located to 403 Main Street.

Today the building looks much different and houses an insurance business.
