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HHS Float Earns Second Place In Saucon Valley Spirit Parade



On Oct. 22, the Annual Saucon Valley Spirit Parade was in full swing with floats and groups marching down Main Street. The theme of the parade, "Honoring Hellertown's Past," fit the Historical Society's bill of preserving the history of Hellertown and garnered the float second place in the "Best Appearing Float" category.

The float, submitted by the Society's members and driven by member Larry Sutton, featured homage to some of the significant places and time periods from Hellertown's past. The truck that pulled the float was decorated with letters that spelled out some of the former notable places of interest around town, including the Eagle Hotel, Brookfield Dairy, and Grant's 5&10 among others.

In the truck bed, several clothing items from the early and midtwentieth century were displayed to showcase some of the textiles featured in the Grist Mill Museum, including an old Hellertown baseball uniform, a World War II military jacket, an older Hellertown police uniform and a World War II civil service jacket.

Behind the truck hung the original Hellertown train station sign along with pictures to pay homage to the transportation hubs that once bustled through the town as well as highlight the significance of the train display that HHS puts on each December. In the trailer bed was a staged living room scene from World War II, complete with an era appropriated family consisting of Wayne Packer and Andrea Danner as parents, Ben Schaller and Megan Madigan as eager 1940s-esque children, and Manny Aguiar as a solider fighting in the war.

Ken explained the history of transportation to the Saucon Valley back in the 1800's up to the present time. He discussed how the industry in the area was impacted by stagecoaches on the roads, boats and barges on the waterways and steam engines on the rails. All of these sources helped to make Saucon Valley a viable marketplace for the products that manufactured were being in Philadelphia.

The room adjacent to the Tavern Room was decorated with photos of old steam engines that used our local railways. On display was the original HELLERTOWN sign from the train station that was located on Front and Depot Streets.

There was a crowded audience of people very interested in his topic with questions and answers along the way. We look forward to having Ken return as a guest speaker in the future with a new topic.

Hellertown History In The Making



While I was driving down Main St. in Hellertown, on Route 412 last month, I went past Bechdolt's Orchard near Springtown, where I saw the historic sign about the "Walking Purchase". I got to thinking. If they went through Springtown area, they more than likely went through Hellertown. That's all I needed and I was off and running to research how Hellertown fit into the whole scheme of things. I saw maps online, but I just couldn't prove to myself and the readers that Hellertown was involved. Then it happened! Ken Raniere was our speaker at Hellertown Historical Society last month, and when he mentioned the Walking Purchase, I almost fell off my seat. "This might be my proof," and by George it was! With the help of Ken and his maps, we could prove that Hellertown was involved.


For those of you who don't know exactly what the Walking Purchase was, and like me, didn't care about it in History class, here is the sad story.

When William Penn left Pennsylvania, he went back to England and left his son Thomas in charge. A big mistake! Like a lot of sons, even today, he racked up a lot of debt, and to pay off his creditors he sold off land. Like a true scam artist, he sold land that didn't belong to the Penn's, but to the Lenape (Delaware) Indians.

Thomas and his agents had to somehow come up with a plan to get this land so they could call it theirs. His father, William, had a good relationship with the Delaware Indians, but when Thomas presented them with a deed stating that the Indians made a deal with William 50 years ago, they were a bit suspicious. This deed, from 1686 said the amount of land would be measured by a day and a half walk from an agreed starting point. The deed lacked the customary signatures of an English deed and the Delawares, who were a part of it, had either moved or were dead. The biggest thing, and I don't know how they got away with it, William Penn never signed the deed because he failed to send enough goods to the Indians to complete the sale. Nevertheless, the walk went forward, but not without trickery on behalf of Thomas Penn and his agent.

Thomas Penn's thinking was, "Why walk when we can hire trained runners". So the plot started to thicken. The first thing they did was to hire the runners, Edward Marshall, James Yates and Solomon Jennings. The Penn agents found three Delawares willing to witness the trek. Next Penn had some colonists, before the walk, check out the land in question and clear paths for the runners.

Now, we are set for the run, or walk as the Delawares assumed. On September 19, 1737 the walkers set out at a rapid pace and then probably, when out of sight, broke into a run. The first guy, Jennings, dropped out. Ahh, the (Continued on Next Page)

poor guy was exhausted. Next Yates dropped out the second day for the same reason but Marshall completed the "walk." He covered 65 miles in 18 hours.


Thomas Penn and his agents got the best land and the Lenapes were left with the bad land. The Delawares that remained ended up working on colonist farms as laborers or as servants. Over the years the Delawares of eastern PA moved to the Ohio River Valley and started trading with the French. This was the onset of hostilities of the Seven Years' War. Many of the Delaware sided with the French. During the French and Indian war, the Delawares raided Pennsylvania frontier towns because of the Walking Purchase.

The Delawares were forced to

move again, by the Government. After 130 years, they ended up in "Indian Territory" which is now Oklahoma.

What do you think? If we had it to do over again, would things be the same? I'm afraid that human greed would again take over. If William Penn would have stayed here and not trusted his son, would things have been different? I have a feeling it would have changed history and the innocent Pennsylvania frontier town's people would have lived to see another day. I wonder what William thought when he heard about the mess Thomas made of things.

Although the Walking Purchase did come through what is now Rt.412, there was no Hellertown at the time.

Did You Know?...

In the past 130 years, many severe storms have hit Hellertown with flooding causing much damage; hurricanes Diane in 1955, Agnes in 1972 and Ivan in 2004.

On July 17, 1890, a very rare tornado hit Hellertown causing an estimated \$25,000 in damages, about \$630,000 today. The mighty rushing storm of wind, lightning, rain and hail that swept through the Saucon Valley was described by the Bethlehem Daily Times Newspaper as "Death in the Whirlwind". The storm came from the Northwest passing through Hellertown heading toward Springtown. The winds were so severe that it pushed a railroad freight car down a siding off the tracks into a ditch. Many farm buildings, roofs and telegraph poles were destroyed. The Bethlehem paper reported that nearly every property owner in Hellertown suffered wind damage.

The big story of the storm was the complete destruction of the year old, well-built, Agricultural Works located in the area of Saucon and Front Streets. Sadly, the paper also reported on the death of 11 year old John Freeman, son of Dr. E.J. Freeman of Freemansburg. The young boy was visiting the Agricultural Woks for the day with a friend and was trapped inside the building as it collapsed.


